A Note from Eliud Garcia (B.M. in trombone performance, '15)

I enrolled as a M.M. student at Yale University after completing my degree at Texas State, spring of 2015. I am about to begin my second year at Yale! This past summer I did a number of things: first, I did a tour with the Yale Wind Band, where we performed at



many cities like Rome, Bologna, and Urbino in Italy. Then we headed to Greece for more concerts in Delphi and Athens. While in Athens, we played at the Elaionas Refugee Camp, which was an amazing experience.

During the same summer of 2016, I also attended the Collegium Musicum in Pommersfelden, Germany Music Festival, which is in fact the second oldest music festival in Europe. During my one-month stay in Pommersfelden, the students of the orchestra lived in a historical landmark castle built in 1711 (Schloss Weißenstein; see the picture) in the Bavarian area, southern Germany. Works by Beethoven, Wagner, Schumann, Mahler, Dvorak, Mozart, Berg, to name a few, were programmed during the festival. I also performed solo and in chamber music.

During my stay in New Haven, Connecticut, I have had the opportunity to perform in Carnegie Hall in New York and was listed as a substitute bass trombone for the Eastern Connecticut Symphony.

I miss all the faculty and friends left behind at Texas State. Hope to see you soon!

3rd Annual Texas State Alumni Choir



members of the Texas State Choral Faculty were joined by three outstanding alumni who represented the generations of Bobcats: Ms. Dianne Brumley ('75), Director Emeritus of Choral Studies, the University of Texas-Brownville; Virginia Volpe ('97), Associate Professor, Austin Community College-Northridge Campus; and Christian de la Cruz ('11), Assistant Director at Ronald Reagan HS in

San Antonio & Associate Director of Music, First Protestant Church, New Braunfels. Current Texas State faculty who conducted included Mr. Craig Aamot, Dr. Lynn Brinckmeyer, Dr. Jonathan Babcock, and Dr. Joey M. Martin.







World Premiere of a New Opera at Texas State

On April 28, 2016, Texas State hosted the world premiere of a new opera: Lady Bird: First Lady of the Land. Written by composer Henry Mollicone and librettist Sheldon Harnick, the opera was commissioned by Texas State Opera Theater, made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. The premiere was attended by Lyndon and Lady Bird Johnson's daughter Luci Johnson, who was moved afterward to call the entire cast to the stage and speaking at length about the opera's effect on her and her hope that the message of the

opera resonates throughout the country.

Mr. Mollicone and Mr. Harnick were in residence for two weeks prior to the performance, giving lectures, providing master classes and participating in informal conversations with students from opera, composition, playwriting, and musical theater. During their residence, Mr. Harnick, already a Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winner, received word that he would be the 2016 recipient of a special Tony Award for Lifetime Achievement.

The Opera has recently been named a semi-finalist for the Ernst Bacon Memorial Award for the Performance of American Music. Future performances will include the New York premiere in Spring of 2017.

A Note from Tom Cervenka (B.S. in music education, '68)

My name is Tom Cervenka, and I graduated from Southwest Texas State College in May 1968 with a B.S. in Music Education. I sang in the choir and played trombone in the band and I was on a voice scholarship. I also sang in several musicals of the Music Department. I was also a member of Phi Mu Alpha. My highlight of my time at Southwest Texas State was being able to sing in the opera chorus in San Antonio in February 1968, when I sang in the Opera *Don Carlo*, which was presented for the first time in the USA with all 5 acts. Only the first 4 acts were performed prior to that time. It was fantastic singing with all of the Metropolitan Opera stars of that time. The lead tenor was Andre Turp from Covent Garden, and it sent chills up my spine to hear him come over the top of us when we are all singing at the top of our voices. President Lyndon Johnson and his wife Ladybird attended one of our performances. President Johnson was an Alumni also of Southwest Texas State College. Even though I was a voice major, I still enjoyed my trombone and played in the Missouri National Guard Band for 2 years in Springfield, MO from 1973 to 1975 and also played trombone in various church orchestras. I still like to sing, but at 73, my voice is not the same.
