Meet Our New School of Music Director: Dr. 7odd E. Sullivan

Dr. Todd E. Sullivan joined the Texas State University School of Music as Director and Professor of Musicology on July 1, 2022. He holds a Ph.D. in musicology and an M.M. in music history and literature from Northwestern University and a B.M. in music education from Denison University. Previously, he served as Director and Professor of Musicology in the Northern Arizona University School of Music, Associate Professor of Musicology and Chairperson of the Department of Music at Indiana State University, and taught at Northwestern University and DePaul University.

A passionate educator and advocate for the arts, he received the Indiana State University College of Arts and Sciences Educational Excellence Award in 2000, was nominated twice for the Distinguished Teaching Award at Northwestern University, and earned accolades as a Gold Axe Award Educator of Influence at Northern Arizona University in 2018. The Flagstaff Arts Council awarded him the prestigious 2015 Viola Award for Excellence in Leadership, recognizing his contributions to the arts on campus and within the community.

Dr. Sullivan's scholarship operates within the realm of public musicology, bridging the space between academic research and the general public. He has written thousands of program notes, liner notes, and educational materials for major performing arts organizations in the United States (Ravinia Festival, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Lincoln Center, Boston Early Music Festival, among others), Canada, Australia, and Spain. Dr. Sullivan's research draws on history, languages, philosophy, cultural practice and values, racial and social justice, psychology, economics, religion, politics, international relations, journalism, business, and digital design and narrative – whatever complementary discipline shines light on the music and its makers.

His publications and presentations reflect a variety of research interests: Renaissance music, opera, French Baroque dance, American popular music, liturgy, and hymnology. Dr. Sullivan has presented papers at meetings of the College Music Society, National Association of Schools of Music, and American Musicological Society, and at the Second International Conference of the Cyprus Musicological Society. In addition, he has remained active as an early-music performer, choral conductor, and church musician.

Dr. Sullivan has held advisory positions on the Flagstaff Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors, Flagstaff Arts Council Board of Directors, Flagstaff Arts and Business Alliance, Terre Haute Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors, Cultural Alliance of Terre Haute (founding member), National Advisory Council for the Kentucky School of Bluegrass and Traditional Music at Hazard Community and Technical College, Arts Fellowship Panel of the South Carolina Arts Commission, and Opera / Choral Panel of the Illinois Arts Council.

At a national level, he has served the College Music Society as Board Member for Musicology, general editor of CMS Books & Monographs, and member of the Nominations Committee, Committee on Academic Leadership and Administration, and Program Committee for the 2016 National Meeting in Santa Fe, NM. For the National Association of Schools of Music, he was elected to the Committee on Ethics (two terms as chair), serves as a Visiting Evaluator, and is an elected member of the Commission on Accreditation.



Charles Aguillon began his tenure as the 12th Director of the



SMU Mustang Band on July 1, 2022. In addition to directing the Southern Methodist University's athletic bands, he is responsible for the cheer, pom, and Peruna handlers programs. An educator for 30 years, he most recently served as Director of Fine Arts and Academic Enrichment for the Lake Travis Independent School District in Austin, Texas. His previous positions as a band director and administrator were in the Georgetown

(TX) and San Marcos (TX) school districts. Mr. Aguillon is a graduate of TXST, where he received both his Bachelors and Masters degrees in Music Education. While at Texas State, he was Drum Major of the Bobcat Marching Band and Assistant Conductor of the Wind Ensemble. Additionally, he holds a Master of Arts in Educational Administration as well as having completed all coursework for a Doctorate in Educational Leadership. As an educator, Mr. Aguillon's Georgetown High School Band program was recognized on the state and national levels and appeared at the UIL State Marching Band Championships and the Music for All National Concert Band Festival. He is in frequent demand as an adjudicator and clinician throughout the state. His resume includes being on staff for the Troopers Drum and Bugle Corps from Casper, Wyoming and his current position as Corps Director for Genesis Drum and Bugle Corps from Austin, Texas. Mr. Aguillon has served on the faculties of Texas State University and Southwestern University, teaching in the field of the marching arts.

Rachel Brown is the new elementary music teacher at Spicewood Elementary in Round Rock ISD.

School of Music M.M. graduates **Kat Buckler** (Music Theory) and **David Catchpole** (Musicology) both presented papers at the American Musicological Society Southwest Chapter conference at UT Austin on October 15, 2022. The title of their papers are, respectively: "Carl Maria von Weber and the Forest Girl: Chromaticism in the Arias of Silvana (1808-1810), Act I" and "Framing of a Secular Saint: The Temporal and Spatial Geography of Considering Matthew Shepherd". David is ABD at NYU, and in addition to working on his dissertation, he has been teaching undergraduate music history courses for the TXST School of Music.

Gene Centeno is a saxophone artist, commercial music performer, and music educator. He's currently in graduate school studying Jazz at the University of Texas at Austin. Gene will appear as a Guest Artist this spring at the 2nd Annual Churchill Jazz Festival.



With 10 years in the profession, **Nick Conte** completed a 3rd year as Head Director of the "Sweepstakes Winning" Owen Goodnight Middle School Band. He performs professionally with both the Cinematic Symphony and Sunny Side Six in Austin.

Brandon Estes (B.M. in music education, '04) is a high school band director in the Chicagoland area, in his 17th year of teaching, 13th year at Naperville Central High School. He is the head director of the marching band program and also co-directs three concert ensembles, jazz ensemble and percussion ensemble. Brandon wrote: "Outside of school, I continue to play the marching snare drum with the Chicago Bears Drumline in my 15th season as a performer and 12th season as the director. This past summer of 2022, myself and a small crew of my drumline colleagues had the opportunity to perform with EDM artist Kygo during his headlining performance at Lollapalooza in Chicago. Most recently, we were invited to join Kygo again in performance during his sold-out show at THE Madison Square Garden in New York City! - When I'm not teaching or drumming, I enjoy spending my time with my wife Natasha and our 3 beautiful children, Bailey (7), Harper (5) and Jackson (1). Besides serving as the Graduate Teaching Assistant and Piano Instructional Assistant at Texas State, she also held the position of associate program director for the 7th Texas State International Piano Festival. Throughout her career, she has participated in several festivals, such as Interharmony International Music Festival in Italy, International Keyboard Institute and Festival in New York, and Texas State International Piano Festival. Mandy also has many experiences as a collab-

orative pianist and had several chamber masterclasses with renowned coaches, such as Margo Garret, the Claremont Trio, and Elizabeth Oaks. Highly sought after as a collaborative pianist, Mandy has performed and collaborated with other vocalists and musicians for NATS, TMEA, and PESPARAWI (Indonesia). Outside of teaching and research, she is also actively involved in many creative programs, such as working with the Ministry of Education and Culture in Indonesia, specifically with the unit of Pusat Penguatan Karakter. She created podcast episodes about Indonesian Folktales, an Anti-Bullying Campaign, and produced a song called "Cerdas Berkarakter". Besides that, she has won the First Prize in the Jingle Competition by Habitat for Humanity Indonesia and Third Prize in the Bicara Makroprudensial Podcast Competition hosted by Bank Indonesia for two years in a row (2021 and 2022). Currently, she serves as the Department Chair of Music at the Conservatory of Music, Universitas Pelita Harapan, leading and managing seven concentrations, including Music Performance, Music Education, and Music Therapy. Her calling is to produce lifelong learners through a highquality and transformational curriculum in Higher Music
